

Cedarville U graduation set Saturday

CEDARVILLE — Cedarville University will hold its 119th commencement at 10 a.m. May 2 in the Doden Field House.

Thomas White, president of the university, will give the commencement message, following one of Cedarville's traditions.

"Dr. White will continue the tradition that started under, I don't know if it was Jeremiah or Dr. Dixon, but traditionally, the president spoke at commencement, so we're continuing that," said Mark Weinstein, executive director of public rela-

The graduating class has 745 students, 702 undergraduate and 43 graduate students. The graduate students have completed masters degrees in ministry, business administration (MBA), education and science in nursing. Next year's graduating class will include the first class of pharmacy students to graduate from the university.

Lori Huckaby has served as the class of 2015 advisor for three years and said she has seen the class grow through the years.

"I have just really watched, especially my class council, really watched them grow over the three years and just mature in how they face decisions, how they handle life," she said.

Huckaby said the graduating class is very socially aware and is constantly raising funds for different needs they see.

"They're a very giving group of kids," she said. "Despite paying for college at the same time, they're very aware of what's around them and the needs around them. I've just appreciated their spirit, their giving spirit."

Among the graduating undergraduate students, Weinstein said, is Cedarville's first Fulbright Scholar, Katie Goehring, Goehring, from Reynoldsburg, Ohio, is graduating with a degree in Christian ministries and then going to Germany

Bike helmets to be given away for safety week

COLUMBUS -Around 9,300 bicycle helmets will be going to children across Ohio thanks to a partnership between the Ohio Department of Transportation and the Ohio Chapter of the American Academy of Pediatrics (AAP). ODOT is contributing \$25,000 to the campaign with the Ohio AAP kicking in another \$14,000.

The effort is part of the

Ohio AAP's "Put a Lid on It! Bike Helmet Safety Awareness" campaign in conjunction with Bike Helmet Safety Awareness Week May 2-10.

"We are incredibly grateful for ODOT's support of our Put a Lid on It campaign, and look forward to this partnership,' said Melissa Wervey Arnold, Executive Director for the Ohio AAP. "With ODOT's support, we will be able to supply three times as many bike

helmets to children than we did last year."

At an event in Columbus, Yay Bikes and CoGo Bike Share joined ODOT and Ohio AAP to distribute bike helmets to local organizations across the state and provided training sessions for biking education, including how to properly fit children with bike helmets.

A combination of efforts is necessary to effectively increase helmet usage rates among

Ohio children including raising awareness of the benefits, encouraging model behavior among adults, distributing bike helmets to Ohio children and advocating for supportive public policies.

'Spring is here and children getting out to enjoy the great outdoors on their bikes. We want them to be as safe as possible by having the right equipment," said ODOT Director Jerry Wray. "We're happy to be a partner in this effort to get helmets to children who may not otherwise have easy access to them."

As part of Ohio's transportation system, the state has 4,207 miles of bike routes and trails. including the Ohio to Erie Trail which connects Cincinnati and Cleveland. Since 2008, ODOT has invested \$60 million into the Safe Routes to School program which builds sidewalks and improves street crossings

and encourages children to walk or bike to school safely.

CU grads excel on CPA exam

CEDARVILLE — Cedarville University accounting graduates continue to perform exceptionally well on the Certified Public Accountant (CPA) exam. According to results from the National Association of State **Boards of Accountancy** (NASBA), Cedarville University students

secured a 77 percent pass rate on their first attempt.

The pass rate is significantly higher than the 50 percent national pass rate. According to NASBA, Cedarville ranks seventh among all small college/universities in the nation and number 25 among 776 universities nationwide putting Cedarville graduates into the top 4% of

all accounting programs nationwide.

"This is a tremendous accomplishment by our recent graduates, and it shows our students are well prepared for the exam and a career in accounting," said Anne Rich, associate professor of accounting.

The CPA exam consists of four sections that amount to 14 hours of testing. Candidates

must pass the exam to qualify for licensure as CPAs.

Cedarville's CPA pass rate is impressive enough, but the National **Association of Colleges** and Employers' recent survey of graduates also shows that 100% of accounting graduates from Cedarville are now employed.

WSU grad

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More than 600 of the graduates are Greene County residents, and more than 1,700 of the graduating students come from Ohio. However, 268 of the graduates represent 28 different nations, 162 graduates representing India alone.

"Many in this class are from Ohio, but many also traveled from across the world to study at Wright State," Hopkins said. "Many more will be the first in their family to graduate from college."

Graduates range in age from 18 to $7\overline{1}$, with the majority of students receiving bachelor

degrees. Fifty-six students will receive associate degrees, 1,340 students will receive bachelor degrees, 706 students will receive master's degrees, and 44 students will receive doctoral degrees at Saturday's ceremony.

John Janning, a Dayton engineer and inventor, will receive an honorary doctorate. Janning perfected the liquid crystal display (LCD) and invented the thermal printer and a Christmas tree light string that stays lit if an individual bulb burns out.

Doors open at 8:30 a.m. May 2, and the ceremony will begin at 10 a.m. in the Wright State Nutter Center. Tickets are not required for attendance.

for a year of study. During the ceremony, 10 students will receive awards for academic achievements. Two students, who will be announced at commencement, will be presented with the President's Trophy, the highest award for a graduating senior. Eight students will receive Faculty Scholarship Awards. These students — Christian Caroll, Joella Gerber, Andrew Gutberlet, Shane Johnson, Jennifer Knepel, Abby Sherman, Kelsey Weir and David Yoder are graduating with perfect grade point averages. The ceremony will also

include an invocation by Lorne Scharnberg, chairman of the board of trustees; a welcome address by Thomas Cornman, vice president for academics; Huckaby will give a prayer of dedication; and Chancellor Paul Dixon, former president, will give the closing benediction. Graduating senior and senior class president Phil Hord will present the senior class gift during the ceremony.

Though commencement is typically an event for family and friends, Weinstein said, the event is open to the public as seats are available.
